From the President:

Just over a year ago a group of public spirited volunteers of this Wisconsin northern region dedicated themselves to the formation of an organization intent on preserving the history of the many small communities and cultures within an area now served by the Northwestern School District of Maple. We chose to call ourselves "the Old-Brule Heritage Society," (OBHS) because the political roots of most of these communities travel back through the history of an older town of Brule, founded in 1886-7, named for the famous Brule River landmark. This large old town of Brule covered an area from the Amnicon valley on the west to the Brule valley on the east, and from the shore of Lake Superior on the north, south into modern Lake Nebagamon. Its town hall was in the heart of Maple, a block from where Northwestern High School has stood since 1948-9. A common high school experience has bonded the communities in this region since then, and with the construction in recent years of the middle and the elementary school complexes we truly have become one cultural area, with Tigermania at times gripping most of us (and we hope sometime this will have to do with Northwestern golf!).

In the course of this past year we have established a record of history related activities which we believe has enriched this community, programs on the CCC, on Clevedon and other local archeaological sites, on the Davidson Windmill. We haven't accomplished everything that needs to be done or all that we've wanted to accomplish, but we continue to move forward in getting systems and organization in place which will endure in carrying our heritages forward into a fast changing future. Large donations from the Town of Maple, and from the Maple Corner School Reunion Committee, and space from the Town of Maple, have given us a solid base on which to start. We sponsored our first scholarship, a web-site will be coming soon, and we are actively pursuing appropriate historical property. Our first fundraising effort, the sale of local historical photos, mounted on magnets, has begun. Our Secretary deserves thanks for this idea.

We can applaud ourselves I feel for a job well done in reaching our one year milestone with the promise of even better things to come. It is only through the efforts of many that this progress could be made, and I thank you all here for your support, board members, membership at large, and the communities which have provided facilities in support of our events. Thanks go out, too, to Mr. Tom McKay in the State's Local History office.

We certainly hope that others will want to join us in our efforts with time, funds, skills and historical artifacts, documents and pictures. We will strive to warrant the public's full trust in all respects. See you at our next program! Jim Pellman

Over the past year the OBHS has received gifts of several historical items. The honor of first donation to our group goes to the **Ernest Erkkila family** of Lakeside who donated Ernest's anvil, forge, and many blacksmith tools, plus some Finnish books and documents.

Dennis Bartholomew of Superior donated a rug loom that had come into his family from the **Kortesmaki** family of Oulu. The loom had been built as a wedding gift by Mr. Kortesmaki for his wife around 100 years ago.

Gene Davidson, besides being one our speakers, also in recent weeks gave the Society two 1934 1 1/2 ton Ford trucks. Typical of earlier farm trucks used in this region, with restoration, one or both, will become part of the farm exhibit we want to complete. Mike Lundeen willingly provided his truck and labor to help us move the vehicles by trailer to the Maple Community Center grounds where Danny Saari tucked them into a corner,

awaiting their final site. Thanks again to the Town of Maple for their patience with us. Gene has other items of interest to our group that await a suitable site for display.

Helen and Harvey Johnson donated numerous old Finnish newspapers and documents.

Many thanks to all of these donors.

We have eyes open for a potential farm exhibit site. This will be a long term project and will take much fund raising and income for startup, annual maintenance and improvements. Leads on farm site, farm items, household and outbuilding, and smaller equipment are always welcome. We must consider easy access by the public, and we do not want to needlessly duplicate the efforts of anyone else locally.
